<b>Subject Overview:</b>	Weekly rehearsals and a series of lectures covering all aspects of traditional music from West Africa—drumming, singing and dancing—culminating in an end-of-semester performance.

<b>Assessment:</b>	Weekly preparation of parts, individual and/or sectional practice and active contribution to all rehearsals, classes and performances as directed (50%); a 10-minute practical examination at the end of the semester (50%) 100% weekly punctual and full attendance is expected. Less than 80% attendance will result in a fail.
