<b>Subject Overview:</b>	<p><b>AIMS</b></p> <p>The aim of this subject is to give students an understanding of the theoretical and technical principles behind systems analysis and software requirements and an understanding of how the theory can be applied to the analysis of socio-technical systems.</p> <p>The subject is core in the MC-ENG Master of Engineering (Software) degree.</p> <p><b>INDICATIVE CONTENT</b></p> <p>The first step in the development of any non-trivial software system is an analysis of the problem domain in order to formulate a set of 'requirements'. In this subject students will explore the aims, principles, processes and techniques involved in business and domain analysis and the formulation of requirements. Topics covered will include: an understanding of the domain analysis problem; business and domain analysis; an exploration of methods for eliciting,</p>									

	analysing, specifying and validating requirements; requirements metrics; analysis techniques for 'special domains' drawn from a selection of enterprise systems, safety critical systems, usability and security.
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	<p><b>INTENDED LEARNING OUTCOMES (ILO)</b></p> <p>At the completion of this subject the student is expected to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1 Be able to understand the role of requirements in software engineering projects</li> <li>2 Be able to understand the different types of requirements, the methods for their specification and the role that they play in system analysis</li> <li>3 Be able to understand the methods for the elicitation, analysis and specification of system requirements and to be able to apply those methods in practice</li> <li>4 Be able to select methods appropriate to a particular application or problem</li> </ol>
<b>Assessment:</b>	<p>•A team-based project (40%) with 3 to 4 team members throughout the semester due in Weeks 9 to 10, each member committing approximately 50 - 55 hours of work , ILO's 3 and 4 are addressed in the project •An individually-based research essay not exceeding 1500 words, submitted in week 12, requiring approximately 25 – 30 hours of work, per student (20%) ILO's 1, 2 and 4 are addressed in the assignment • A 3-hour end-of-semester written examination (40%). ILOs 1, 2, and 4 are addressed by the end-of-semester examination. Hurdle requirement: To pass the subject, students must obtain at least 50% overall and •at least 50% (30/60) in project work; and•at least 50% (20/40) in the written examination. Intended Learning Outcomes (ILOs) 1 and 2 are addressed by the individual essay. ILOs 3 and 4 are addressed by the team project. ILOs 1, 2, and 4 are addressed by the end-of-semester examination.</p>

<b>Notes:</b>	<p><b>LEARNING AND TEACHING METHODS</b></p> <p>The subject comprises a two one-hour lectures and one hour tutorial per week. The lectures are used to elaborate and interpret material and the tutorials are designed to indicate how the lecture material can be applied. The project forms a major component of the practical application of the subject and is used to focus a significant part of the teaching on a practical problem.</p> <p><b>INDICATIVE KEY LEARNING RESOURCES</b></p> <p>The subject is administered through the Universities Learning Management System (LMS). Templates for the various artefacts, guidelines on analysis processes and links to requirements analysis tools are available through the LMS. A standard environment is made available that includes modelling and diagramming facilities together with material compiled from a number of popular and current textbooks and available textbooks.</p> <p><b>CAREERS / INDUSTRY LINKS</b></p>

	<p>The software industry is expanding and along with it the demand for software engineers that are capable of the analytical and management skills beyond programming. The industry is also changing in the nature of the projects being undertaken with many software engineers now working in multidisciplinary project teams. The skills and experience gained in this subject are valued by employers and are often seen as a necessary grounding for a career in software and technology related industries.</p> <p>The subject provides students with a realistic environment in which to apply and learn the theory and practice of requirements engineering. Projects are chosen from case studies that are made available to students and where possible industry guest speakers are invited to speak to the case studies.</p>
