The discipline offers both great range and detailed attention to particular places, times, and themes. Courses extend from the medieval world and the great empires to our most immediate past; all offerings reflect the latest developments in historical research and vocational practice.</p>														
Learning Outcomes:	<p>Students who complete the Graduate Certificate in Arts in this area of specialisation should:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # demonstrate a detailed knowledge of several periods or cultures of the past; # locate, identify, analyse and contextualise materials that provide insight into the past; # display a critical understanding of a variety of conceptual approaches, both national and international, to interpreting the past; # understand the development of the discipline of History, its past and present; # understand how historians relate and respond to their social, cultural, and political environments; and Demonstrate the ability to research on a defined topic according to the methodological and ethical conventions of the discipline; # engage with, and respond to, divergent historical interpretations using critical thinking skills, including through student-centred group work; # demonstrate a high level of clarity and fluency in communication and collaboration, including oral and written presentation of evidence-based narratives and effective work in small groups; and # reflect critically on the knowledge and skills developed in the study of history, and on how these might be applied to scholarship, employment and citizenship.
