Subject Overview:	In this subject students consolidate the basic elements covered in Latin 1, and are introduced to more complex grammar and syntax. Increasingly difficult literary and dramatic texts are read. Background information on Roman culture is woven into the subject matter throughout the semester. By the end of the subject, students should have a sufficient grasp of the language to read texts of moderate difficulty with vocabulary assistance. Students who complete this subject may progress to Latin 3.												

Learning Outcomes:	Students who successfully complete this subject should: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> # have acquired the elements of the grammar, syntax and vocabulary of Latin; # have attained reading skills sufficient to begin reading literary texts.
Assessment:	Assessment exercises totalling 2000 words, due during the semester (50%) A 2000-word examination held during the end of semester examination period (50%) Hurdle Requirement: Students are required to attend a minimum of 75% of classes in order to pass this subject. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject. Note: Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per working day. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked.
