Subject Overview:	<p>This subject builds on the concepts introduced in Learning Area Humanities 1. The major focus of this subject is to develop further teacher candidates understanding of the nature and purposes of humanities education in years 7 to 12. Teacher candidates will continue to explore the Australian Curriculum/AusVELS. They investigate the pedagogies associated with the disciplines of humanities in the secondary school, exploring ways to foster conceptual understandings and inquiry skills. This includes consideration of literacy and numeracy strategies appropriate to the humanities (interpreting source material in history, analysing data in geography).</p> <p>The focus of the subject is on learning and teaching that is research led and uses disciplinary and interdisciplinary approaches to curriculum design and implementation. Through research and reflection teacher candidates will explore and critique recent developments in humanities education and their impact upon curriculum design and teaching approaches.</p>
