<b>Subject Overview:</b>	Students negotiate an individual project relating to education with an individual supervisor. The project includes a critical review of relevant academic and research literature and a research project relating to educational practice.

<b>Assessment:</b>	A research report (15,000 words), due at end of second semester of enrolment, (100%). This subject has a minimum hurdle requirement of 80% attendance at all tutorials, seminars and workshops.
