The Graduate Diploma in Journalism (Advanced) is comprised of three compulsory subjects, totalling 50 points, together with a limited list of journalism related electives (50 points). Together these would represent basic journalistic skills and understandings, with the opportunity to study a limited number of advanced subjects.

The Selection Committee may seek further information to clarify any aspect of an application in accordance with the Academic Board rules (http://about.unimelb.edu.au/academicboard/resolutions) on the use of selection instruments.</p> <p>4. The minimum English language requirements for this course are Band 7.0.</p>
