<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject will focus on the second total war of the twentieth century and will explore questions about the causes of armed conflict, the nature of total war, and some of the consequences (social, economic, cultural and political) of total war for modern European and global history. Among the topics we will examine this semester are the following: the situation of Europe and Japan after World War I, the rise of facism in Italy and Germany, interwar diplomacy and its failure to preserve peace, the origins of WWII in Aisa and Europe, the barbarism of warfare, the home front experiences in the conditions of total war, the Holocaust, and the legacy of total war.
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	On successful completion of this subject, students should be able to: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># demonstrate a general knowledge of the principal figures and significant events of World War II;</li> <li># understand the concept of total war and its impact on politics, society, economics and culture;</li> <li># gain an understanding of some of the historiographical arguments on topics related to World War II and the practice of total war;</li> <li># be able to analyse primary and secondary sources in constructing historical arguments;</li> <li># demonstrate research skills using printed and electronic sources in preparation of a critical primary source analysis; and</li> <li># develop skills of critical thinking through group discussion of subject readings and preparation of written assessment.</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	A 2000 word primary document analysis due mid semester (50%) A two hour written final exam during the examination period (50%) Hurdle requirement: Students must attend a minimum of 75% of tutorials in order to pass this subject. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject. Note: Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be

	penalised at 10% per day. After five days late assessment will not be marked. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked.
