Assessment:	Two class assignments (each of 1000 words) due during the semester [40%] A project (3000 words) due at the end of semester [60%] Hurdle requirement: Students must attend a minimum of 75% of tutorials in order to pass this subject. All pieces of written work must be submitted to pass this subject. Note: Assessment submitted late without an approved extension will be penalised at 10% per working day. In-class tasks missed without approval will not be marked.
