<b>Subject Overview:</b>	<p>Complex analysis is a core subject in pure and applied mathematics, as well as the physical and engineering sciences. While it is true that physical phenomena are given in terms of real numbers and real variables, it is often too difficult and sometimes not possible, to solve the algebraic and differential equations used to model these phenomena without introducing complex numbers and complex variables and applying the powerful techniques of complex analysis.</p> <p>Topics include:the topology of the complex plane; convergence of complex sequences and series; analytic functions, the Cauchy-Riemann equations, harmonic functions and applications; contour integrals and the Cauchy Integral Theorem; singularities, Laurent series, the Residue Theorem, evaluation of integrals using contour integration, conformal mapping; and aspects of the gamma function.</p>									

<p><b>Learning Outcomes:</b></p>	<p>At the completion of this subject, students should understand the concepts of analytic function and contour integral and should be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># apply the Cauchy-Riemann equations</li> <li># use the complex exponential and logarithm</li> <li># apply Cauchy's theorems concerning contour integrals</li> <li># apply the residue theorem in a variety of contexts</li> <li># understand theoretical implications of Cauchy's theorems such as the maximum modulus principle, Liouville's Theorem and the fundamental theorem of algebra</li> </ul>
