Entry Requirements:	<p>All candidates must demonstrate readiness for full-time graduate study for a period of four semesters and meet all the following requirements:</p> <p>UM Language requirements IELTS score of 7.0 (no band less than 7); or TOEFL score of 577 + TWE 4.5; or TOEFL computer 233 + essay rating 4.5; or TOEFL internet of 90 + written 21</p> <p>NUS Language requirements IELTS core of 6.0; or 580 for the paper-based TOEFL; or 237 for the computer-based TOEFL; or 85 for the internet-based TOEFL (with a minimum score of 22 for the writing section)</p> <p>Applicants who are admitted into the programme must complete a number of statutory requirements before commencing the programme. To be compliant with the University and in the placements, it is a requirement that students complete the following forms and are also aware of:</p> <p>Applicants who are successful in gaining a place in the programme must complete International criminal history checks (http://www.ahpra.gov.au/Registration/Registration-Process/Criminal-history-checks/International-Criminal-History.aspx) as part of their application for provisional registration. This is a separate requirement from police checks required by the University of Melbourne.</p>
