The project will embody the results of the student's own research and it is expected that the research topic will relate to a discipline or study area relevant to the EMA and/or to career development. It is strongly advised that students contact the EMA Course Coordinator in the semester prior to enrolment in this subject so that appropriate supervision and expectations can be discussed.

Assessment:	1. A research report or thesis of 10,000 words (100%). Due one week after the end of semester. Hurdle Requirements: The following hurdle requirements must be met in order for students to be eligible to submit the final report or thesis: Submit a 200 word project proposal by the end of week 1. Submit a 5000 word draft mid-way through semester. Submit a full draft of the report/thesis 2 weeks before the end of semester. Attend at least 4 supervisory meetings.
