<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject covers the theory and practice of teaching and learning improvisation in cross-cultural perspective. Examples will be drawn from the world's major improvised music traditions — Jazz, North Indian classical music, Persian and Arabic classical music and West African and Brazilian percussion ensembles. The subject is geared towards music educators, musicians with an interest in world music, and music students with an interest in theory and method in ethnomusicology.
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	<p>On completion of this subject, students should have gained:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• An understanding and appreciation of improvised music traditions from Asia, Africa and the Americas</li> <li>• An understanding of the specific methods of both oral and literate improvisation pedagogy in world music traditions</li> <li>• An understanding of the ways that different improvisation pedagogy methods derive from specific musical aesthetics and produce distinct musical practices</li> <li>• A fundamental understanding of the relationship between the practices of musical improvisation, approaches to musical pedagogy, and socio-cultural contexts for music in five major music cultures</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	Research paper of 3500 words, relating to improvisation pedagogy, due six weeks after the final class (75%); 30 minute presentation on research paper topic, in the final class (25%).
<b>Prescribed Texts:</b>	Musical Improvisation: Art, Education, Society, ed. Gabriel Solis and Bruno Nettl. Urbana: University of Illinois Press, 2009 A reading pack, including articles on Jazz education, North Indian music education and Brazilian music, will be distributed prior to the first class.
