Such people are normally employed as policy and program planners, trainers, teachers, performance auditors, managers and consultants. They are drawn from public sector organizations (in areas such as education, welfare and health), non-government agencies, business, or from consultants offering evaluation services.</p> <p>The course aims to enable students to become familiar with theories underlying policy and program development, the roles of various types of evaluation as well as key concepts and approaches to evaluation. It will encourage critical review of important issues in the design, conduct and use of evaluation.</p>

<b>Entry Requirements:</b>	<p>In order to be considered for entry, applicants must have completed:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># an undergraduate degree in a social or human science; or</li> <li># a postgraduate qualification in social or human science; or</li> <li># a relevant undergraduate degree with at least three years of documented relevant work experience;</li> </ul> <p>AND</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># provided a personal statement outlining relevant prior study, work experience and why they wish to be considered for the course.</li> </ul> <p>Meeting these requirements does not guarantee selection.</p> <p>2. In ranking applications, the Selection Committee will consider:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># prior academic performance; and</li> <li># the personal statement; and, if relevant</li> <li># the professional experience.</li> </ul> <p>3. The Selection Committee may seek further information to clarify any aspect of an application in accordance with the Admission and Selection into Course Policy.</p> <p>4. The minimum English language requirements for this course are Band 7 English language requirements.</p>
