<b>Subject Overview:</b>	This subject is designed to introduce students to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander issues in the context of social work responses. The subject begins with an overview of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander history, including pre-contact, colonisation and contemporary developments. Specific attention will be paid to engaging communities - including practice principles, strategies and skills. This subject will emphasise the importance of critical self reflection.
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	<p>This subject will</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- introduce students to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander history</li> <li>- introduce students to the history of social work practice with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and communities</li> <li>- build awareness and understanding of contemporary Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander issues in Australia</li> <li>- introduce culturally responsive strategies and skills for working with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples</li> <li>- foster critical self reflective practice</li> </ul>
<b>Assessment:</b>	Group project participation, 10% Group presentation (10 - 20 mins) and 1500 word individual written summary, mid semester, 50% Written assignment (2000 words), end of semester, 40% Hurdle requirement – a pass result in all three assessment tasks
