<b>Subject Overview:</b>	Students will utilise the knowledge gained in previous subjects in the Avian Health Online program to investigate major disease syndromes including respiratory disease, immunosuppression, neoplasia, production decline and lameness.						
<b>Learning Outcomes:</b>	<p>Upon successful completion of this subject, students should:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li># Integrate knowledge of pathology, microbiology and serology, food safety, public health and economics and apply it to major disease syndromes</li> <li># Obtain data from poorly performing flocks and undertake analysis to identify causative factors of poultry diseases</li> <li># Analyse data and assess results to implement cost-effective decisions</li> </ul>						
<b>Assessment:</b>	Assessment is carried out at the end of each month. Student progress is monitored through class exercises and case studies. The final examination is a three-hour written and online exam held in weeks 16 and 17. Students will be required to arrange an appropriate venue (e.g. a nearby university) to sit this assessment under supervised examination conditions. The breakdown of assessment is: Three monthly assessment tests worth a total of 25% One major class assignment worth 10% Class participation worth 5% A three-hour written and online exam to be held during the end-of-semester exam period worth 60%
